
Construction and operations update

Caloma Two open cut

In July, Tomingley Gold Operations received approval from the NSW Department of Planning and Environment (DPE) for the modifications ('MOD3') applied for last year. This includes the establishment of the Caloma Two open cut, approval for the entrance to future underground mining activities (known as a portal) at the Caloma pit if needed, and a small cut back to the existing Caloma pit.

All approvals and licences are now in place for Caloma Two, including the amended Environment Protection Licence (EPL), granted in early September. A comprehensive sediment and erosion control plan has been developed for the new pit, designed to help ensure all dirty water runoff is trapped and recycled on site. The EPL permits the enlargement of sediment basin four (one of five existing sediment basins) and the establishment of a sixth. Construction works are underway on these.

Despite the recent wet weather, other construction works underway include preparations for the movement of the Caloma Central Drain to make way for the Caloma Two pit, as well as development of the pit perimeter access road.
